In accordance with clause 16.5 of the Frankston Football Club Incorporated Constitution, notice is now given that the Annual General Meeting of the members of the Frankston Football Club Incorporated (Club) will be held on 26 February 2025 at the Frankston Football Club Clubrooms (Cnr Plowman Place & Young St, Frankston 3199) commencing at 6 45pm (Meeting).

This must be sent by post or electronically must be received by the Secretary of the Club no later than seven (7) days before commencement of the Meeting.

L. Business

2. Election of Board members

To elect three (3) Board members to the Club in accordance with the Club's Constitution, being:

- Pippa Hanson, being a Board member of the Club (whose term in office expires at the conclusion






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PRESIDENT'S



It has been a year of contrasts for the Frankston Football Club. Whilst on-field results in season 2024 exceeded the Board's expectations, our off-field performance in FY24 was extremely disappointing.

The Board, acting upon the recommendations of the external football department review undertaken by Donald McDonald, made the strategic decision at the end of 2023 and start of 2024 to invest in a full-time coach. This decision, which ultimately led the Club to hire Jackson Kornberg, was a masterstroke which immediately bore fruit – player attraction and retention saw immediately improvement and in 2024 the men's team played an exciting brand of competitive football.

However, this investment came with the obligation on the Club to deliver a consistent level of commercial and sponsorship income so as to maintain our financial equilibrium. For a number of reasons, this did not eventuate.

As a result, the Club has posted a negative financial result for FY2024. The result is not acceptable.

Since being appointed President in September 2024, myself and the Board have been analysing many aspects of our business in order to place the Club on more sure financial footing. These efforts have been immensely successful, with an encouraging year-to-date net profit result and all commercial and sponsorship metrics of the Club showing significant improvement in the first quarter of FY25. All signs are pointing to a strong result at the end of FY25.

We also have a renewed and strong relationship with our naming-rights partner Kinetic, and our other major partners, Online Flatpacks, Highgrove Bathrooms and the Graham Family Trusts. We also thank Frankston City Council for their ongoing support.

The Board will now look to the medium and long term revenue aims of the Club, including reviewing current nonfootball revenue such as Functions by the Bay and exploring alternative revenue streams. Whilst you have heard this before, under my leadership, this will be done.



On the field, what a year it was. Our first men's finals campaign in the Victorian Football League since 2008 was successful – Tyson Milne's goal in the dying minutes against the Gold Coast Suns will live in the memories of all Frankston supporters for many years.

And our Division 3 women brought home the premiership cup in the MPFNL – the Club's first premiership of any description since 1997.

But we can do better. The mentality of the Frankston Football Club is shifting into a winning one – we have two excellent football programs, a slew of great signings and high levels of retention. The Club are – and should – expect winning seasons for both teams.

More broadly, the Club remains disappointed with the progress of the AFL's Competitive Balance Review into the Victorian Football League. The Club ultimately seeks two outcomes:

1.a commercial environment which treats the Frankston Football Club as a partner in the growth of both the Victorian Football League and the sport of Australian football; and

2.a long-term commitment from the Australian Football League to the Victorian Football League with a governance structure that includes the Frankston Football Club and other standalone VFL clubs.

We are hopeful that this can be achieved in 2025.

My view is that it has never been a more exciting time to be a member of the Frankston Football Club – so if you have not signed up, please do so. Season 2025 promises to be an amazing journey and one that the Board and I are committed to lead.

I'll see you on the Hill in 2025.

A NEW ERA



It was an honour to be appointed as the Senior Coach of the Frankston Football Club last October, and it's a responsibility that I haven't taken lightly.

The club spoke about 2024 being a "New Era", and this extended to all decisions we made through the course of the pre-season.

It started at our information night – where the theme of "fun and enjoyment" was first brought up to the group. "You want to be driving from work to training thinking 'I can't wait to get to training'." People think that you only have fun after you win – I'm the opposite. I think the winning follows the fun.

We unfortunately lost several key players prior to me joining the club, so the first job was retaining the core remaining list, as well as targeting specific positional needs, that fitted the club.

In that, we recruited George Grey, and forward/midfielder from Casey, who played in their 2022 premiership. Noah Gown, a key forward from Sandringham followed, along with teammates Tyson Milne and Tomo Owens. Powerful midfielder Tom Murphy returned to the club, after a sensational year at Somerville in the MPNFL.

Adding to this list, we also brought in Harrison Coe, Nick Burke, Taj Campbell-Farrell, Will Kennedy, Ollie Moran, Matt Nelson, Matt Aldous, Josh Mounter, Harrison Jones, Jet Peckett, Troy Maggs, Denver Lund, Kyle Stainthorpe & Lachlan Sharp. With 19 new players joining the club, it signalled a tremendous shift in list profile, demographic and age.

On the coaching front, we were wrapt to secure the services of Damien Keeping to look after our ever-evolving backline. Damien was the inaugural AFLW Senior Coach at the Carlton Football Club, and has had tremendous coaching experience in his journey. Troy Hemming joined the club from Tarwin Sharks FC, where he looked after our dynamic forward line, and Tim McGibney returned to the club after a successful stint as midfield coach the previous year. Finally, Sam McMillan joined us as development coach / runner, spending time specifically with our defence.

Behind the players and coaches sit an enormous operation that tends to our players loads, medical needs, and supports the overall program. The appointment of Jordan Love as our new High Performance Manager was significant, and he immediately hit the ground running. He formed an excellent partnership with our Head of Medical Services, Greg Dea, and Rehab Physio Guy Agutter in maximising availability throughout the season.

A conscious decision was made to connect our players to the past. We held an player induction night, where we heard from club greats Bryan Mace & Peter Geddes, and Josh Newman returned to the club to share his experiences on being a captain through a significant period of history at the club.

There was a few changes to our leadership group for 2024. Trent Mynott was appointed as the sole captain, after being co-captain in 2023. He was joined by newly appointed vice captains Joe Lloyd, and George Grey –who were unanimously voted in to support Trent in his captaincy. Finally, to round out the leadership team Taine Barlow was elevated into the group, alongside Tom Murphy, Noah Gown, and existing leadership group member Jackson Voss. This group of seven young men led our club to new levels this year, and will continue to as we progress forward.

The season started with promise, with early victories against Port Melbourne (our first win at North Port Oval since 2006), Coburg, Northern Bullants, GWS and Sydney, to take us to a 5-2 start to the season.



As with any team, there was teething with a new system and style of play. It was always going to take time. A challenged block in the middle of the season saw us compete against three of the last four Grand Finalists, as well as an away trip to Brisbane.

We kept revisiting our theme, and our purpose – which was to win and to have fun. Overall, this was our compass and our rock throughout the season.

We steadied the ship, and were able to win five of our last six games, including wins against Collingwood (which was our first in 10 years), against Casey (who we hadn't beaten at Kinetic Stadium in 16 years).

A win against Port Melbourne on a Friday night in front of a massive crowd albeit assured us of a spot in the Wildcard Finals, which would mark our first final since 2008.

The challenge was set – a wildcard final against the reigning premiers, Gold Coast, at Peoples First Stadium.

A see-sawing game saw the lead swap multiple times, until a late flurry in the third quarter and early in the fourth saw Gold Coast go up by 27 points, 6 minutes into the final quarter. Battling with one man down on the bench, after Tom Murphy unfortunately hurt his ankle in a marking contest early in the third quarter, we were faced with a momentous task.

George Grey hit the scoreboard, followed up Jackson Voss, Seb Quirk, and Blake O'Leary, before the moment everyone remembers – a Tyson Milne goal from 55m out. The rest is history.

Unfortunately the following week, we weren't able to match the fierce challenge Southport put in front of us in the Elimination Final, but the pride both myself, the staff, and the broader Frankston community have of our playing group is immense.

We built a season on the basis of fun, enjoyment, connection and gratitude. For us, that is the formula moving forward – and moving into 2025, our belief and processes won't waver.

Individually, we had several success stories out of the year. George Grey was selected to represent Victoria in the VFL v SANFL representative side in Gather Round. George represented himself and the club with pride.

Matt Johnson kicked 47 goals, and was selected in the VFL Team of the Year alongside George Grey and Tom Murphy. With three members of the team of the year, Frankston had the equal second most representatives.

Finally, Tom Murphy was a worthy winner of the Peter Geddes Medal. It's not often someone is able to come back from local football and have the level of impact that Tom did in 2024. I have said it countless times, but whilst Tom is an incredible footballer and has had a sensational year, I am more proud of Tom the person, and he is someone we are incredibly lucky to have wearing the Frankston guersney.

Once again, thank you everyone for your support of the club not only this year, but for previous years. We are a club built on hard work and perseverance, and we can't wait to continue to have your support moving forward.

FRANKSTON FOOTBALL CLUB

FRANKSTON FOOTBALL CLUB INC.

Established in 1887, the Frankston Football Club has been a central figure in the world of Australian Rules Football on the Mornington Peninsula. Initially, the club competed in what is now known as the MPNFL. After much success at a local level, the club joined the Victorian Football Association in 1966. In 1976, the club finished the home and away season on top of the ladder for the first time. In 1978, the club tasted the ultimate success with their first premiership in the VFA defeating Camberwell by 14 points at Prahran oval. In 1996 the AFL took the VFA under its umbrella and the competition was renamed the VFL. Many former VFA teams chose to align with powerful AFL clubs, however, Frankston Football Club remained true to itself and the region, and chose to stand alone.

In 2021 VFL expanded to include all of the AFL clubs on the Eastern Seaboard and now includes 21 clubs in the competition

The Frankston Football Club is determined to stay independent and represent the Mornington Peninsula in the newly expanded VFL competition in 2021 and beyond. We've also entered a women's team in the South Eastern Women's competition in 2021 with the goal to join the VFL Women's comp in the future. In 2024 this culminated in our first Women's Premiership in our history with the D3 MPFNLW team creating history with a stirring win over Seaford.

We pride ourselves on offering a pathway for young local talent to ply their trade at the highest level and get exposure to the AFL. Upon completing their career with Frankston, we know these young men and women will return to their local clubs as better footballers, better people, and an asset to their community.

TREASURER'S

The 2023-24 financial year (FY24) marked a significant period of investment and transition for the Frankston Football Club. From a financial perspective, the transition was headlined by our long-standing Treasurer, James van Beek, resigning in August 2024.

Following a challenging on-field season in our VFL men's program in 2023, the Board made a decisive commitment to rebuild the football department. This included appointing the club's first full-time senior coach, which led to an immediate transformation and the club's first finals campaign and victory since 2008. Additionally, in FY24 a second women's team was introduced to further expand our successful women's program, culminating in a senior division premiership.

Shortly before the start of FY24, the club also invested in a new Chief Executive Officer to enhance professionalism and drive commercial outcomes.

However, the backdrop of FY24 presented significant economic challenges. Deteriorating economic conditions, coupled with high inflation and interest rates, placed pressure on many industries, including ours. As a business reliant on discretionary spending from members and customers through corporate events, hospitality, food and beverages, and sponsorship, the club was significantly impacted. Despite achieving linear growth in our Functions by the Bay business over the previous five years—almost reaching \$1 million in revenue in FY23—this trajectory stagnated in FY24. The club also experienced declines in key revenue streams: sponsorship fell by over \$100,000, and membership decreased by approximately \$16,000 compared to FY23. Additionally, administration costs increased by approximately \$37,000 largely due to the club's stated investment in staff.

These factors resulted in a net loss of \$168,458 for FY24.

In response to this result, the Board has taken immediate steps to strengthen the club's financial position. Life Member Adrian Lloyd has been appointed as Commercial Lead to drive sponsorship and fundraising income. Additionally, the Board made the difficult decision not to fill the Chief Executive Officer role following the recent departure of Fraser Bayne.

These strategic decisions aim to ensure the club's financial viability while more sustainable business models are explored and developed.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to departing staff and contractors in my portfolio. Our bookkeeper, Colin Lane, and remittance contractor, Jane Webster, have both concluded their service with the club. We sincerely thank them for their years of commitment and dedication. Additionally, after many years of service, Lionel Arnold has stepped down from auditing duties due to health reasons. We extend our heartfelt thanks to Colin, Lionel and Jane for their valuable contributions to the club.

Moving forward, Julie Francis has been employed as the club's new Accounts and Administration Officer, while local firm Shepard, Webster and O'Neill has been appointed as the club's auditor. These appointments have finalised the reorganisation of the club's financial management approach, following my appointment as Treasurer in September 2024.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Note 1: Material Accounting Policy Information

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or Amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations Adopted

The Association has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of Preparation

In the Committee's opinion, the Association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purposes of complying with the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*. The Committee have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of Frankston Football Club Inc.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires Management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in Note 1(m).

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements:

a) Income Tax

The Association is exempt under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 as a non-profit organisation. As such, no allowance has been made for Income Tax.

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

c) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

d) Revenue recognition

The Association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the Association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the Association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Volunteer services

The Association has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other form of contribution received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory us determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received.

f) Good and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

g) Plant & Equipment (P&E)

Property, plant and equipment are brought to account at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value. The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The carrying values of plant and equipment are also reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable. If any impairment exists, the assets are written down to their recoverable amount and the loss recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Rates of depreciation vary between 10% p.a. and 40% p.a.

h) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in results from Continuing Operations.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the Association would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

i) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

j) Leases

The Association has elected to not apply AASB 16 *Leases* at this time.

k) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

I) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

m) Critical Accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires Management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, Management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Performance obligations under AASB 15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. Management exercises judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, Management includes the nature/ type, cost/ value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The Association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.
